Any Fountain Bowl league bowler in good standing is eligible for the tournament provided he/she has bowled a single scratch game high enough to qualify for one of the three divisions listed below.

Bowlers are automatically entered into the highest division for which they qualify. Your handicap is based on your highest average at Fountain Bowl, with a minimum of 21 games bowled. The tournament consists of bowling 3 games, with the top four finishers in each division going on to the TV-style roll-offs on June 24 at

9am.

Cash prizes for each of the men's and women's divisions are awarded from 1st to 25th place, with a total of 150 bowlers "cashing" in the tournament!

Last year more than 1,400 bowlers rolled qualifying games, and of that number, 843 signed up to bowl in the tournament. We're looking to see even more bowlers coming out this year. Set aside the weekend of June 16-17 for some great, free bowling!

You can bowl with your friends, too. Anyone in any category can bowl with anyone else from any other category on any squad where there is room.

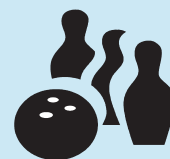

Faces of the Future

Tuesday morning, March 27, 2007, the Fountain Valley Rotary Club opened its doors to some very special students from the Fountain Valley School District. Joining them were their parents, teachers, and school administrators. Also present were Fountain Valley School District Board Member, Pat Harney, and President Pro-tem Christine Allcorn, as well as Fountain Valley School District Superintendent Dr. Marc Ecker.

eleven nominees from the Fountain Valley School District (pictured on page 4) with a generous scholarship of \$500.

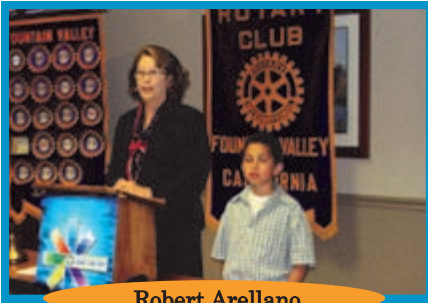

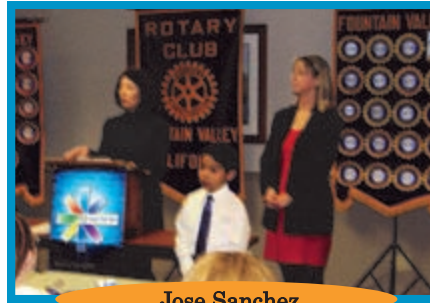

Ozzie's Challenge Singles League Tuesday Nights at 9:30pm

There's a new league on the block! Wally Booth, who has been the subject of a former interview, has helped put together an entirely different type of league that is exclusive to our house. Here are the details Wally provided The Fountain Pin.

FP: How long have you been involved with bowling?

WB: Since the 1950s.

FP: You have served as an officer and as a secretary in several leagues over the years. For how many leagues are you currently serving as Secretary?

WB: Three leagues... Four for Fun, Joker's Wild and Ozzie's Challenge

FP: What made you decide to start something new?

WB: About three years ago Dave Osborn told me he wanted to create a league that would really challenge the bowlers. And, of course during the summers the center hosts the Sport Shot Scratch League on Monday nights. But Dave wasn't getting the challenge he wanted. So, we were talking last year and I found out we had access to the PBA oil patterns for our lanes. Dave had the idea of this challenge for the bowlers. So, I put together "Ozzie's Challenge."

Dave inspired the formation of this league. And, in my opinion, when Dave inspires something, it gets done!

FP: You are an Ambassador now. Was this idea in your mind before you became an Ambassador?

WB: I just became an Ambassador late this past year. This league started last September and just ended its first season in March. We started up again the first Tuesday of April and we'll run for 21 weeks—20 weeks including sweeps and roll-offs. The format is such that we lay out the five PBA oil patterns four weeks each. We have an individual champion of each of the patterns. So, we have five individual champions available at the end of the season. This first season we actually had four winners because Jason Milligan was champion twice. The four winners, plus four other qualifiers, bowled in a roll-off on sweeps night, in bracket-style eliminations. They were seeded based on the number of wins. The winners were the top seeds; the qualifiers were the bottom seeds. It was an enjoyable format for a roll-off. Ten of the twelve bowlers were within ten points at the end of the season, with one hundred points being available—one hundred games were bowled this season.

FP: You bowl four games and the pattern changes every session, every four weeks, right?

WB: That's right. There's a type of league out now called "the PBA experience" whereby they bowl a different pattern every week, based on what the PBA bowled that week. Dave wanted people to improve their bowling, not just by

being challenged, but also by getting the opportunity to get used to the pattern and improving over time. Because of this, in the summer we run one pattern for four weeks, then a different pattern the next four weeks, etc. In the winter, we run one pattern for five weeks, then another for the next five weeks, etc.

FP: Who determines the pattern, whether it be the Scorpion or something else?

WB: The first time through we went alphabetically from A-E and this time we'll go backwards through all of them. We'll finish with A. Every Saturday and Sunday mornings, the last four lanes

in the house are reserved for the PBA shot for those who want to practice on that format. During the first two hours the center is open on Saturday and Sunday, if a person comes in and asks for it, they can bowl on those lanes with the PBA shot. We lay out the shot that we will have the following Tuesday. A person who wants to bowl on that shot and improve his/her bowling can receive instruction at that time. Our pro-bowlers, Will Wilson, Jason Milligan and Tennelle Milligan come down and help bowlers.

They also help bowlers after our league on Tuesday nights. It's fun. Even though it is \$25.00 an evening, we still get back better than \$2.00 a point for wins. Additionally, there are five side pots. One is high handicap series for the week, which receives \$25.00, basically covering your league fees. There is also one side pot for each of the first three games as handicap games. The side pot for the fourth game is scratch. The payouts for these two side pots are based on \$1.00 per bowler.

FP: So, it's a four game handicap, individual-format league?

WB: The basis of the handicap is 80% of 230. For the first two weeks, the handicap is frozen, based on an individual's "normal" book average. It's a maximum handicap of 40 pins. Anyone coming in with anything less than 180 still only gets 40 pins handicap. After an individual has established an average in this league (which requires 8 games) then the bowler's handicap becomes 80% of the highest average in our league. Last season we opened with 80% of 230. Later, after our league was up and people were established, then it became 80% of a variable between 201 and 204. Literally, people's averages were probably 25 pins down from what they normally bowl.

FP: It's not a "sport" shot, though?

WB: No, it doesn't qualify as a "sport" shot. It's a PBA shot. It qualifies as a standard ten pin shot. The difference in the two is that a sport shot is a 2 to 1 oil pattern between the outside and the center of the lane. In other words, for every unit of oil on the outside, there are two units in the center. A house shot, or the PBA shot, it could be 7 to 1, seven parts of oil in the center or more. Some house shots have as much as 50 units of oil in the center of the lanes and outside the ten

boards it can get out to only 2 or 3 units of oil. And, all of a sudden you're looking at 15 or 18 to 1. The four major tournaments of the PBA are all sport shot conditions, all 2 to 1 oil patterns. The standard PBA shots are not. The "odd ball" pattern of the major PBA tournaments is the one used for the Dick Weber Open. It is not a sport shot; it's called a "Zebra" shot. It's a strange pattern all to itself, a "retro" shot used occasionally back in the 1960's. They oil every other board. The newest machines can do 39 individual boards.

FP: In your league how does play proceed?

WB: We have two people per pair of lanes; the person that is on your pair is your opponent. And then you change lanes and opponents each game. You end up bowling four games across four different pairs of lanes against four different opponents. Each bowler has the possibility of one point per win per game. Regarding ties, you only get half a point if your opponent is not there and bowls a make-up or if you bowl a blind score. If there is a tie, there is a three frame roll off (bowl new eighth, ninth and tenth frames). There are no forfeitures on our league. If a person does not make up in the required time, then we use their average minus 15 pins. And, it is not necessarily the "kiss of death" because on these patterns anything can happen. A bowler can bowl a 130, then a 230, then a 120. It happens; it is demanding. Every bowler on our league has had a 75 pin swing, and that includes our pros on the league!

FP: When will your league start up in the fall?

WB: We'll start up again in mid September. We bowl at 9:30 pm on Tuesday nights.

FP: You've got 12 bowlers right now. Let me ask you. How many bowlers would you like the league to have?

WB: Double that, maybe 24 to 30. One of the ideas we've been kicking around for the fall is the possibility of a weekly "blind draw doubles" whereby every bowler would have a different doubles partner every week. But you'd have the same partner throughout

the night and share points. You'd possibly get to be a "team member" with a pro and maybe have the advantage in 4 games and about two hours of "intense instruction".

FP: Now, for this league you are looking to attract what kind of bowler? What should they have when they come into your league?

WB: The bowler who seriously wants to improve. They should have an interest in improving and a 180 plus average. It's not necessary, but since they start out with a 40 pin handicap, they'd need to be an above average bowler. I think we have a couple of women of this caliber bowling at Fountain who may look to come in. We had a blast all season long! I finished twenty pins under my average, but I gave it my best and really had a ball. Most of the bowlers who bowled during the first winter said they're coming back for our next winter season, even if they can't come for the summer. One nice thing I forgot to mention is that we got about five bowlers new to Fountain. Some had heard about it and were interested because they were bowling elsewhere on a PBA experience

- 4.** Norm Duke. He became the youngest-ever champ in 1983 when he won in Cleveland. His next title came in 1991. That year Norm Duke won twice.
- 5.** Earl Anthony. He dominated the PBA in his prime. Six times he topped the money list. In 1975, this late Hall-of-Famer became the first to break the \$100,000 mark in a single-season.
